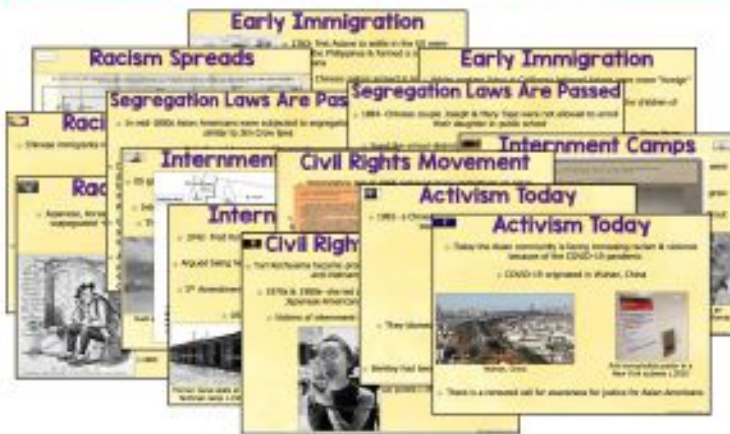

Asian American history

During the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Asian immigrants faced significant challenges in the United States. 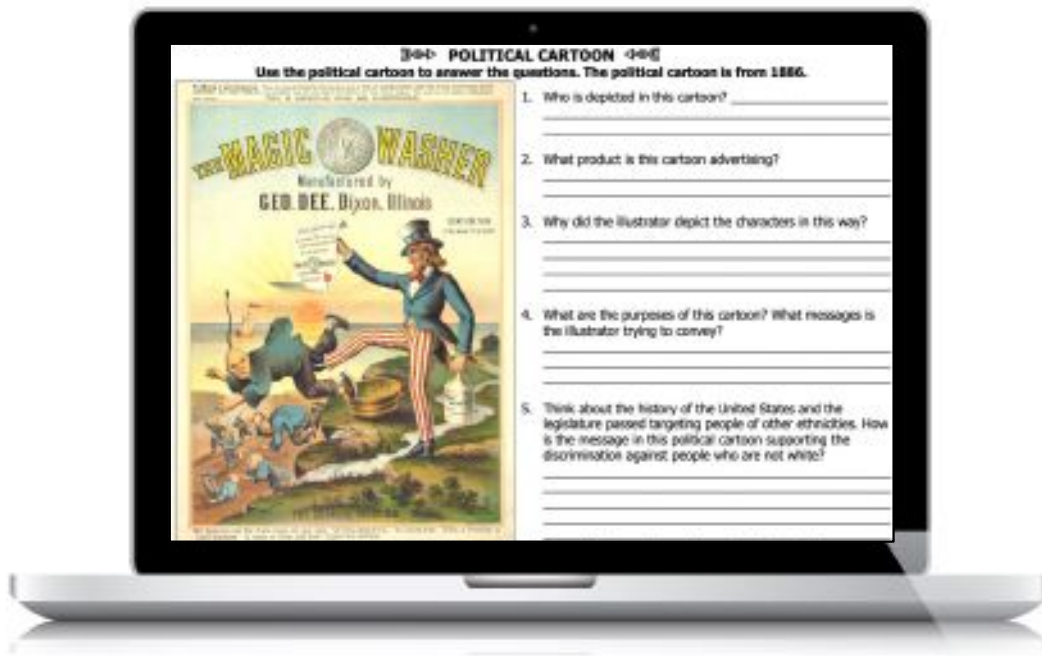
